

# Lecturers plan strike



Unions balloting their members

Exam results could be delayed

By Patrick Smith and Jessica Salter

Lessons and exam results face disruption again as lecturers consider whether to strike over pay disputes.

Strikes are set to hit both Leeds universities after negotiations over pay broke down. AUT and NAFTE members at both Leeds University and Leeds Met were balloted over strike action on Friday 13 January. The result is expected on February 19.

The unions are calling for a 20 per cent pay increase over three years

When asked whether the proposed action would lead to disruption for students, Povey insists that the dispute would last "one or two days at the most" and that the amountement of some exam results could be telawed.

"It's better that students suffer a couple of days' disruption than get poor teaching for years. We have to do this."

According to figures released by the AUT, the University and College Employers' Association (UCEA), which includes the Leeds University Vice-Chancellor Professor Michael Arthur and other senior university staff, have seen their salaries rise, on average by 32.1 per cent. The average salary for a university principal is now over £150,000. During the same period, lecturers' pay has risen by 9,44 per cent.

A spokesperson for The University of Leeds said: "Leeds was one of the first universities to reach agreement early last summer with all our unions on a new pay system based on princi-

ple of fairness and equality, which put a extra £8million into the pay packets of our staff, and delivered substantial increases in particular to the lowest paid, and to academics.

"We believe it's one of the best pay agreements in the country. This is a national dispute which we hope will be resolved through negotiations." Leeds Uni spends about 60

Leeds Uni spends about 60 per cent of their annual turnover on salaries.

Leeds University Union say they are sympathetic to lecturers' cause but are worried about the impact on students. Seb Elsworth, FCS officer said: "LUU clearly recognises the unique contribution which well motivated and enthusiastic staff make to our members" university experience."

In contrast to Povey's call to plough the money generated from top-up fees into pay increase. Elsworth said: "The additionally money now being fed into the sector, through top up fees, to which we were all opposed, nevertheless provides a unique opportunity for investment in bursaries, student facilities and crucially additional academic staff to reduce the staff-student ratio."
The UCEA had offered

The UCEA had offered another round of talks over pay in February and claims the unions are heing rash in their decision to strike. The employers also assert that the unions raised their claim at the last moment to an unreasonable rate, which stalled negotiations.

Elsworth said he was most worried about the strike adding additional stress to students.

additional stress to students.

He said: "This is a time for all sides to be pragmatic and we should seek to use the limited additional revenue for the best interests of staff and students."

In a full-page advert in the frimes Education Supplement, UCEA Chair Geoffrey Copland said: "Higher Education employers are deeply disappointed with the decision to declare a dispute.despite our offer of serious positive megotiations on their last-minute pay claim"

Mr Copland adds that the amount asked for would amount to more than half of the extra money in higher education from tuition fees and Government investment that universities expect to earn by 2008-9.

## mpaign for change

The NUS has launched a campaign to recognise trans' rights after a transsexual woman was refused her state pension at the age of 60.

Sarah Richards is a male-to-female trans who underwent gender reconstruction surgery in 2001. She proceeded to apply for a state pension that is, by law, provided for women, aged

60 and men, aged 65. However, Social Security is distributed on the basis of the details

shown on a person's Birth Certificate. Under UK law prior to 2005, these details could only be altered for factual or clerical reasons. This resulted in Sarah's application being rejected as the Department of Work and Pensions did not recognise her status as a woman and therefore her right to draw a state pension five years earlier.

Richards was consequently forced to go to the EU court of human rights to gain recognition as a woman. Her case was brought before court on December 15 last year and Advocate General Jacobs of the EU passe the judgement that the refusal to grant a pension to a male-to-female transsexual at the same age as a woman is contrary to community law.

Upon further consideration, the Advocate General added: "Given the relatively few people who would be affected by the judgment, the financial implications would not create a risk of serious economic repercussions in the UK

Yet the Gender Recognition Act, passed in 2004 and implemented in April 2005, should arguably have solved the issue as it allows for the issuing of gender recognition certificates under certain conditions.

Leeds University's Lesbian, Gay, Bisexual and Trans Assembly Chair, Nic Turner, said: "It's concerning that the British government failed to recognise that they have their own domestic laws which provide trans people with full legal rights in their acquired gender, most importantly the right to equal treatment

This law should have been upheld and Sarah Richards should have being given her pension at the age of 60, just

Although the European Court of Justice is still deliberating as to whether to fully implement the Advocate General's conclusions NUS Trans Officers, James-J Walsh and Kat Louis were pleased with the Advocate General's unequivocal opinion.

Louis said: "It is excellent news that the EU has taken such a strong stance: a trans woman is a woman, and should be treated exactly the same.

"Following Sarah Richards case the NUS is calling on the government to pass legislation that guarantees equal treatment for transsexuals, as is being done for the Lesbian, Gay and Bisexual Community as part of the Equality Bill."

Critics say the idea of including trans within the Equality Bill is neither likely or necessarily welcome, given the controversy caused by the Gender Recognition Act. The Evangelical Alliance expressed serious concerns following the Act.

A spokesperson said: "There is unwelcome potential under the Bill for the criminalisation of law-abiding, common-sense people who do not accept that gender can be self-deter-mined, that legal fictions such as a legal women can be created, and who believe that it is not bigoted or wrong to believe that marriage is uniquely between a biological man and a biological woman. The Alliance believes that recourse to law and cosmetic surgery is a dangerous way to respond to psychiatric conditions.

When asked specifically about the case of Sarah Richards, Don Horrocks, the Head of Public Affairs for the Evangelical Alliance, refused to comment directly on her case

Individuals within the medical profession have expressed opposition to the legal recognition of trans people. Neil Whitehead of the Christian Medical Fellowship wrote in his article, Are Transsexuals Born that Way?

Transsexuality appears to be the result of a complex interaction

between biology, social environment and personal choice. Relationships between the sexes are intended to mirror that between Christ and his bride, the church. Transsexuality is therefore wrong; The Christian Medical Fellowship was also unable to offer a statement specific to the case of Sarah Richards

Sarah Richards' case is likely to be one of the last of its kind due to the fact that updated Birth Certificates can now be issued and that the Government plans to raise the female retirement age from 60 to 65 from around 2010-2015

This case, however, highlights the latent inequalities that remain inherent within a legal system that has yet to adjust to the new rules laid down by the possibilities of gender reconstruc-

Nic Turner said: "Even though there is still a long way to go until Lesbian, Gay and Bisexual people gain full equality, there is an even longer way to go for trans people to receive full equality and legal protection. This is why the NUS campaign for Trans rights should be supported.

The society's website lists the academics who should be investigated, professors which range from teaching classes in politics to Chicano studies. They are each given a scale of radicalness, indicated in the form of black fists. The scheme - which provides free tape recorders - has left academics worried about

its witchhunt-like qualities.

Many of the professors targeted have complained, and the University of California is now investigating whether selling the recordings are actually a breach of copyright regula-

But the Association denies the witchhunt claims, saying: "We are concerned solely with indoctrination, one-sided presentation of ideological controversies and unprofessional classroom behaviour, no matter where it falls on the ideological spectrum."

A look at the featured professors' profile, though, show the type of people that features on their 'spectrum'

One feminist professor given the maximum five black fists is attacked for making a joke about a penis, and for believing that the Californian governer election that Schwarzenegger went on to win would be a close call.

History Professor Russell Jacoby is given three black fists for daring to make students think. The website condemns Jacoby's teachings, using evidence from a student who believed that after being taught by the profes sor, "you will begin to question the world around you"

Another page displays what Jones and his colleagues are really worried about. It states "One aspect of this radicalisation...is an unholy alliance between anti-war professors, radical Muslim students and a pliant adminis-



Last Monday morning the trial of the infamous BNP leader, Nick Griffin, started at Leeds Crown court. The case, with Griffin and party activist Mark Collett, a Leeds Uni graduate charged with incitement to racial hatred, is expected to last many weeks and will cost the taxpayer hundreds of thousands of pounds. The investigation has already spanned one year and cost over £1 million.

Amid heightened security, Mr Griffin, from Llanerfyl, Powys, waved to his supporters amid cheering and flag waving. The mood at Leeds Crown Court was surprisingly calm, if not a little noisy. This did not stop the extra deployment of dozens of West Yorkshire police officers in full uniform - most of whom didn't appreciate the approach of student reporters coming to interview members of the pro-testers and supporters of the British Nationalist party. But this case was more than just incitement to racial hatred, fascist party politics, and leftwing union anger. At its highest level this case could reach the European Court of Human Rights, with lawyers arguing to which fundamental human right takes precedence: the right to freedom of speech, or the right to live your life without fear of intimidation

and physical abuse, Chris Johnson, third year Philosophy student and Unite against Fascism activist had come to protest.

He said: "The BNP are a group of anti-homosexual, anti-Semitic, and anti-every-thing group of Nazis. The cost of the trial, both inside and outside the court room, is insignificant compared to the right to be able to protest against far right political

Debra Simons, from the teacher's union NASUWT, was frustrated by the defiance of Griffin and Collet.

She said: "This will be win-win situation for the BNP. If Griffin goes down for incite-ment to racial hatred then the fools who support him will say he is a martyr for their cause. but if he gets off it then they will say that this is a victory for freedom of speech."

When asked to clarify the elements of the protest which NASUWT was endorsing, Simons said she was there to protest against fascism common theme amongst the protesters. Simmons also com-mented: "If the British Nationalist party were in power in this country women would be forced to live a life at home, people of coloured skin would be removed from the country and even David Beckham would be deported for having Jewish grandpar-

On the other side of the pavement, unemployed postal worker and spokesman for the BNP, Nick Cass was eager to share his views on the day's events and what the British Nationalist party stood for "We're not racist," he said. "We work with Sikhs and Hindu.

No representatives from either ethnic group were protesting with the BNP.

"We're not anti-Semitic either; we have a practicing Jewish councillor sitting on the Epping Forrest council under the BNP banner." Cass was unablet to remember the representative's name,

Cass staunchly defended the right to freedom of speech: "Millions of people fought and died in two world wars and if Nick Griffin wanted to take the p\*ss out of Islam, then surely he is allowed to."

The case however is not about the freedom to express opinions on religion, but about the freedom to encourage and to incite people to hate, to commit bodily harm and to commit murder on people of another rac

"We all know what a menace Islam can be," said Mr Cass to the direct question as to his reasons for joining the BNP

When quizzed as to the British Nationalist Party's policies on repatriation of people from ethnic minorities he said: "We don't want an allwhite Britain any more. It's

Mistakes have been made in the past, but now we've got to take hold of what we have left—if things continue like this we're going to be a minority." He continued: "We don't want to be a minority—people who live the British way of life and don't plot against us are free to live with us though—we don't have a prollem with them living here."

Cass then went on to comment about the history of British immigration: "British people don't want immigration and they were never asked if they wanted immigrants.

The only reason they are here is because the British government asked these people to come" – refusing to understand that the government is elected by the people and is therefore making decisions on their behalf.

Cass summed up his argument on behalf of the BNP: "The British Nationalist party is a respectable party. And the current establishment doesn't want the apathetic middle-class to vote for British culture, the British way of life and Christian values.

"The people who don't like us are Communists – and they don't believe in family values, British culture, the British way of life and Christianity."

When directly asked about his views on the substantial cost to the taxpayer with having fifty police officers on duty to monitor the protest against Griffin's trial, Mr Cass said that the BNP had been in contact with West Yorkshire Constabulary and had told them that police presence was not necessary.

He said: "the BNP were not violent."

The case continues.

## Top-up fees for trainee teachers opposed

A group of MPs have concluded that the introduction of top-up fees will put students from poorer backgrounds off teaching.

These concerns are the result of the

These concerns are the result of the £3000 price-tag to be introduced for the post-graduate certificate in education.

A third of all teachers in the UK are set to retire within the next fifteen years and, currently, 22 per cent of newly qualified teachers leave the profession within three years. Until now, new trainees have been drawn to the profession by the absence of fees, coupled with golden hellos, bursaries and attractive starting salaries.

The Labour MP for Newcastle-under-Lyme, Paul Farrelly, who put down the motion, said: "The move to charge fees marks a considerable shift from the present situation and must be reviewed if we are to encourage students from less traditional backgrounds into the teaching profession."

The fees will obviously affect students at Leeds University. Catherine Benzie, a finalist Education student at Leeds University intending to do a primary teaching PGCE said: "Although increased fees would obviously add to the debt I have already accumulated as a student in Leeds, I'm determined to do the PGCE and would tolerate the extra debt. However, for many students this is extremely off putting and may deter them from becoming teachers."

The UK's first clinically based weight management study has shown that long term weight loss is made easier if participants can loo on when they need extra guidance.

log on when they need extra guidance.
Dr Sara Kirk, from the Nutrition
Epidemiology Group at the University of
Leeds, developed ukweightcontrol.co.uk to
provide free, unbiased approach to losing
weight, based on current available evidence.
The website provides advice, tools and
information about changing behaviour and
diet habits. Kirk monitored 180 slimmers
for a year.

22 per cent of site users lost 5 per cent of their original weight, a clinically significant weight loss.

The results are not as dramatic as ones advertised by popular diets, but Dr Kirk said it showed the difficulty of keeping the weight off. She said: "It's relatively easy to lose weight in the short term but we wanted to monitor long term weigh loss."

Obesity problems have ballooned in the

Obesity problems have ballooned in the ast 25 years, and now over two thirds of the adult population are overweight or obese. A report by the World Health Organisation warned that obesity contributes to one third of cancers or the breast, colon, kidney and samach and that obesity related deaths rank only behind smoking related illness.

only behind smoking related illness. "Obesity is so often associated with the belief that there's this magic pill out there, when really tackling it is down to hard work, despite the barrage of contrary messages, especially at this time of year" Dr Kirk said.

Kirk, a former dietician, said that dieters often felt that they needed more time and support than dieticians could practically offer.

She said: "People used to tell me they needed me there 24 hours a day telling them not to eat this and that. That's where the idea of a website came from."

The team have just presented their report for review and hope to get funding so they can keep the free website open. Dr Kirk said: "Obesity is a national prob-

Dr Kirk said: "Obesity is a national problem and if we could translate these results across the county it could be really important for the nation's health."

## Mullholland fights to defend abandoned animals in the commons

Greg Mulholland, MP for Leeds North West, will today attack the Government's long-awaited Animal Welfare Bill for not including abandoned animals, during its Second Reading in the House of Commons

MPs are currently debating and agreeing the contents of the new Animal Welfare Bill before it progresses through Parliament and becomes law. The Government Bill will, for the first time, require owners to properly care for their pets and thus prevent thousands of animals from suffering ongoing neglect.

Speaking on the Animal Welfare Bill, Greg said: "Last summer, I paid my first visit to the Yorkshire Animal Shelter in my constituency. This shelter, like many others, is run purely by volunteers and takes on animals from cats and rabbits to ponies and goats. Most of the shelter's work involves taking on animals which have been abandoned by their own-

"Every year the RSPCA is forced to investigate tens of thousands of abandonment complaints, indicating the scale of this problem. It is time as a society that we faced up to this and the problem is that this Bill largely fails to do.

Leeds City Council has this week proposed a ban on anti-social street drinking in areas heavily populated by students.

The Designated Public Place Order affects revellers between St Anne's Road and Headingley Lane, who could face fines of up to £500 if taken to court.

The decision comes as a result of residents' complaints about alcohol related issues. Local group HEAL, an information resource for residents and community associations, highlights the difficulties residents Their website poll "Is students' alcohol misuse a problem in North West Leeds" returns a 100 per cent yes vote accompanied by countless reports of residents being woken in the early hours by the drunken behaviour of students returning home.

Headingley-based rugby and cricket organisations are already helping to crack-down by enforcing strict alcohol regulations during matches and authorities say this must stretch to the entire community.

Councillor Martin Hamilton stands by the proposals. "It is clear from our initial consultation that there is strong support in Headingley for the type of ban we are proposing" he said. Similar schemes have been successfully enforced in both Hampshire and Dorset, where fines can be as high as £80. The public have until February 7 to appeal against the proposals

# Sexual harrassment allegations at Ellerslie

Male students complain to Uni

## Subwarden being investigated

**By Rachel Hunter** 

A subwarden at Ellerslie has suddenly left his position, amid complaints of sexual ssment

One male student at the halls of residence has made a formal complaint against the warden, who had worked there for seven years. Another male student also claims that the subwarden spoke to them using explicit sexual language.

Cian Farah, a first year Economics and Management student, had often chatted to the warden. He said: "He'd been pretty friendly for the first few weeks of

But after committing offences such as being too noisy and smoking marijuana, Farah was asked to see the subwarden in his room, where Farah claims he was subjected to verbal sexual harassment.

Farah said: "He started saying some weird stuff. He asked me if I was wellendowed and even usked if he could have a look. I just thought 'I've got to get out of here'

A second first year student, who does not wish to be named, claims to have had a very similar experience

He alleges: "I had gotten in trouble literally every day - I had to meet [the subwarden] in his room about it, and he basically started coming on to me. He told me he'd given students blow jobs in the past.

"I didn't feel I could go and talk to anybody as I'd already been in trouble. If I tried to report him, he could say I was

Farah added: "I didn't know what to

do, whether to tell someone, or confront him myself."

After deciding to make a complaint to the Hall Office, Farah was advised to make a formal complaint to the University Accommodation Office:

He said: "They were shocked- they said the matter would be taken very seriously

A few days after the complaint was made, the subwarden left Ellerslie.

A current subwarden has also made an official complaint against the same sub-

He said: "[The subwarden] often asked me about the sexuality of certain students and would boast about previous

A university spokesperson confirmed that a student sub-warden has been asked to move out of University accommodation following the launch of an investigation into allegations of inappropriate comments to fellow students.

The post-graduate sub-warden has since resigned

The spokesperson added: "The University encouraged two students involved to report their allegations and come forward to discuss the matter

We are satisfied we've done every thing we can to support them and to ensure they are happy with the outcome. No formal action has been taken as no official complaint has been laid?

Subwardens are volunteer students who receive a discount on rent and are expected to identify potential problems and offer informal advice to students."

The spokesperson assured: "Students wishing to be subwardens have to make an official application and their references are checked. Any problems or disciplinary matters are referred by them to

But Farah does not believe this process is sufficient

He said: "I really think this is a big issue. There should be an opportunity for students to give feedback on the war-

Calls for NUS Reform

House prices fall

Student house prices are set to fall by up to 5% next year, according to reports The nosedive comes as a result of the 2004 Homes Act, which comes into play just in time for house-hunting in

A report has slammed the NUS as outdated and irrelevant for the 21 century stu-

But the National Union of Students welcomed the Mori report conducted to gauge the perceived and actual future role of the institution. Through focus groups, one-to one sessions and interviews the message was clear, the NUS has been "failing to meet some of the expectations of its constituent members for a number of

NUS General Secretary, Tumelty, said; "Reform of the NUS has been seen as internally focused and imposed on the membership without consultation.

The reports found that the NUS "is facing financial pressures that are unsus-tainable". The problem is that the organisation does not have sufficient financial resources to sustain the services which it currently provides.

Because of this, student unions across the country are unhappy with the current affiliation fees. This has led to the sugges-tion that the NUS needs to discover other sources of income. The introduction of a NUS extra card was discussed in the report as an additional way of raisingfunds. But this idea received a mixed response, some students vehemently opposed to a "two tier" style of member

The report sets out objectives to which the NUS should be judged accordingly. These include "championing democracy and diversity, representing the student voice, promoting the welfare of students. developing, supporting and empowering local and national activists and campaign

ing for change".

The NUS hopes that by setting out an aspiration statement they can ensure that they respond to the changes of the 21st

## **Drinkers only get half cut**

Drinkers in Leeds are being sold short on a night out. Trading standards officials in West Yorkshire used undercover tests to expose landlords who were serving halfmeasures on spirits.

Ten bars in the Leeds city centre area were caught out in the sting and council chiefs have admitted their concern at the

They found that quantities of spirits served during the tests were 22 per cent short on a 25ml serving – with many drinks of this type costing as much as £3 per measure.

It means that many of the region's students could be caught short as they enjoy

themselves on a night out. Graham Hebblethwaite,

Yorkshire's Chief Trading Standards Officer, declined to name and shame the bars which had disgracefully served lesser measures. But he revealed the practice would no longer be tolerated. He said: "Spirit drinks have tradition-

ally been sold in bars by the use of approved optic measures or thimble measures of known accuracy

"Either thimble measures are not being used correctly to dispense drinks in full view of the customer, because they are not poured to the brim, or measures are being free-poured from the bottle without measuring.

"Errors were sometimes found even when thimble measures were used but the greatest variations occurred with free poured spirits.

Andrew Short, a third year History student, said: "They should only use

optics and not the thimble measures. If you buy an expensive whiskey at £3 a shot you could be losing around 50p if

you're under poured by 22% so I think it's definitely something to be concerned

It has become fashionable to free-pour drinks in bars but students would prefer if the measure quantity came first.

Alex Mills, a second year English and Philosophy student, said: "We don't go to bars to watch bar staff trying to be cool, we go for a good drink. It's stupid that free pouring is cool and I'd much rather get a full measure as opposed to getting ripped off on a night out.

In addition to the possibility of alcohol being under-poured, there is a danger of people consuming more alcohol than they think if measures are over-poured.

Councillor Keith Wakefield, member of West Yorkshire Trading Standards Committee, said: "This is not a responsi-ble way to sell alcohol and could lead to customers consuming more alcohol than

## University groups unite to fight fees

Top-up fees are being blamed for the reported drop in university applications. This January, UCAS figures are predicted to show that, for the first time in eight vears, the number of prospective students are decreasing.

But the current £3,000 charge may be increased following the 2008 review of tuition fees. Any decision to push up tuition fees again would likely come into effect in 2010. This has prompted a number of leading educational organisations such as NATFHE, ATL and NASWUT to form the alliance, Coalition 2010.

The NUS have now officially joined in the fight against the modification of the £3,000 cap.

President of the NUS, Kat Fletcher, said: "The evidence is already mounting that tuition fees will not open up access to Higher Education, particularly for students from less traditional backgrounds."

The upcoming UCAS figures support this view, which does not bode well for the government's target of getting 50 per cent of 18-30 year olds into higher education by

Given the apparent failure of this campaign the Coalition, and other concerned parties, have pressed for answers from the Government as to their future intentions.

In the space of a week, the Early Day Motion has already got thirty-seven MPs signed up in support. Coaltion 2010 have also begun research into the effect of higher variable tuition fees, an online petition on their website and plan to collect testimonials that demonstrate the issues surrounding students created by high tuition





If the motion is passed then marking for the summer examination period will be boycotted, meaning agonising delays for students waiting for their results. In the case of finalists, this delay could have a knock-on effect on their

future plans if graduation ceremonies are postponed.

LS fully supports the lecturers' requests for a pay rise matching that of senior staff. It is lecturers who provide students with education, the bread and butter of university experience. 
I for one would rather be at home with my family indulging on what is left of the festive period than be that all important 'first' in the store.







ment project, it is clearly not on a par with professional collections from well-known publishing houses, however it does take itself seriously, the jacket blurb advertising a multitude of wonders from the very best young poets

First impressions, however, are not promising: Jo Pearson's verse is exactly the kind of flat, uninspired rambling that plagues contemporary poetry. By turns either dull or incoherent, and relying on primitive imagery and metaphor, it concerns itself chiefly with the 'modern woman's burden', in a Bridget Jones-Cosmopolitan-Sex and the City sense, and while I'm sure it is heartfelt enough, it lacks any kind of deep-er insight and so comes across, just like the subjects it deals with, as wholly superficial. Daithidh MacEochaidh is more promising. While not possessing significantly greater lyrical dexterity, he addresses a more significant and relevant set of themes, and does so from a more fundamental, enlightened, perspective. Sadly he also seems to have a needlessly contrarian, rebellious attitude where it comes to 'traditional poetry'; his poems often seem as though they are trying to come across as less clever than they realto come across as less clever than they real-ly are, and while his use of phonetic spellings occasionally adds greater depth to a piece, it often seems to be nothing more than a meaningless gesture of anti-estab-lishment 'working class pride'. Nevertheless, his poems are sharp and insightful, even if they do lack the facility with language I expect from anything calling itself poetry.

I had high hopes for Peter Knaggs's Tolstoy on a Horse, as on first glance it appeared to contain several intriguing recurring themes, and some excellent titles

often novel and fun, and occasionally conof Tristram taining deeper emotion or insight, generally lack depth and substance, making the collection an enjoyable but not greatly rewarding experience.

Overall I found this book disappointing; it reinforced my suspicions that contemporary poets no longer value poetic language. While it conatins some interesting topics and viewpoints, this book is almost entirely without elegance, ingenuity of phrasing or word-choice, something that I personally consider fundamental to the art of poetry. However, for those who enjoy contemporary poetry, and are interested in discovering new poets, I would recommend this book, if only for the fact that you get three for the price of one.





The hilariously camp Brian bursts onto the scene declaring "Benny's deadl" to which Richard responds with passionate remorse, leaving Ellie convinced they must have lost a good friend from college. Her uncomprehending exasperation on realising they are talking about Benny Hill is one example of the cleverly executed gender dynamics in this play. The relationship between Ellie and Richard is the main plot line, offset or their amusing (friendshir)

with Nick and entertainingly gobby yet dim witted wife. Who Richard is having a long standing affair with. Natalle Walter delivered an extremely impressive performance as Nick's wife, Lisa. Her complete facial transformation as she stepped out to receive the audience's appreciation was testimony to her degree of immersion in the role. One of the subtler and more moving aspects of the play is the way in which the deeply personal and private aspects of Ellie and Richard's marriage intrude onto the public scene. Ellie, despite her infundating arream, does not hide the uncomfortable aspects of their marriage by hiding behind a fabricated mounting for a dead comedian.

It was difficult to ascertain whether the play was intended partially as a tribute to Benny Hill and his comic predecessors, or a criticism of his faintly perverted, immendo laden visual sketches. It is fair to condude that it's a combination of the two, with Ellie's sardonic disapproval voicing the 1990's modern fernale subjectivity, while the hillard ously quirty sketches acted at the Dead Funny society celebrate the legacy of major British standup and IV comedians.

This sensitive, multi-layered play was acted with considerable flair by the company. (7)

after I had left the theatre. Alice (Annalene Beechey) has the ability to balance perfectly the Sightly pretentious side of Alice's character with her childish naivety. Along with Alice, the rest of the cast take on their roles with real gusto which is reflected in their performances. The supporting cast display the characteristics of the animals they are portraying impressively and the white rabbit is brilliant in bustling around the stage in a constant rush. Admittedly this stage version of Alice in Wonderland had a lot to live up to; the story has been around for over 100 years after all. I feel, however, that the play met the challenge and the stage version is as crazy and suspended from reality as the book.

I would recommend going to see this play to anyone if only to return to the glorious days of childhood. On entering the playhouse I guarantee that you will revert to the mental age of eleven and see this story through a child's eyes. Annie Proulx's short story of the same title is a riveting and rugged piece of writing. This adaptation adheres, with plenty of padding, to the essence of the story. It is not about homosexuality or just gay cowboys. This is a film about regret, loss, fear and, most importantly, love, the taboo of the love between Ennis Del Mar (Health Ledger) and Jack Wrist (Jake Gyllenhaal). As is characteristic of Ang Lee the pace is constructed slowly, allowing a smooth build up which elicits a response of heightened emotion (be prepared to lose half a response or neignment enrotton (be prepared to lose half the water in your body through your tearducts). The brilliant opening scenes between Ledger and Gyllenhaal are set beautifully against the powerful Wyoming mountains. This is a deeply sensual experience, as evemptified by a viscoral scene where hundreds of moving sheep fill the screen and lit-

erally take your breath away.

Of the two leads it is Ledger who gives the more convinc ing portrayal. Ennis is a quiet man hardened to graft and the rugged nature of life. In his youth his father takes him to see a castrated homosexual, and this hammers into his psyche that being a queer will cause the gravest of dangers. This one defining moment instils the ultimate fear which then determines the tragic course of his relationship with Jack. Ledger's performance is controlled to perfection and a huge part of this is in his deep Southern drawl. Ledger keeps his voice so deep and muffled that his character and age transcendence is authentic; this is a slight problem for the duplicitous Gyllenhaal whose overall performance exhibits his gripping screen presence, but reveals that his maturity as an actor is not yet fully developed. However, Gyllenhaal is excellent as the partner who more readily accepts his some-

exceient as the partner who more reasily accepts its some-times predatory sexual needs and the love he feels. Michelle Williams and Anne Hathaway ably support as the cheated wives. Williams, always the best Dawson's Creeker in acting terms, is amazing as the frumpy ultra-Desperate Housewife. She knows Ennis's sporadic fishing trips' with Gyllenhaal are not what they seem; in one scene she looks on as the men share a sly klass and her desolation is conveyed superbly.

There are not enough superlatives for this utterly devastat ing film. It should be shown to every human being to deary homophobia for what it truly is, and does not need to be spelled out here. It is a flawless love story featuring the most beautiful screen couple ever to grace the silver screen and adds another gem to Ang Lee's almost impeccable CV. His representation of relationships reaching crisis point, especially Sense & Sensibility and The Ice Storm, both immaculate films, has found a new high. Whilst the screenplay honoured the simple tone of the book, it did not convey or explore the breadth and depth of its compas-sionate storytelling. Admittedly this didn't stretch to much more than 'name the rare break' and the obligatory hip hop smoking of a blunt, shouting out "who likes smoking weed out there" and then rapping about getting roached. A brief mention needs to go out to the Momentum drum and bass boys, TC1 and 3rd Generation Digital, who where keeping it rolling along nicely in the conservatory - which made for a nice break from the sweaty madness of the main room Following some liquid drum and bass respite,

went back to the main room to see Madlib had hit the drum kit and, self-indulgently, proceeded on with a half-hour jazz and funk jam. It was a cool interlude, but Mad's skills on the drums are clearly far from the 'proper' drummers that he samples and admires. Following on from Madlib and J Rocc, Peanut Butter Wolf let loose on the decks and played some reggae and funk cuts, he even sneaked in Ziggy Stardust! Although the set was lacking in length, Test Icides performed numerous crowd favourites, including 'Boa vs Python' and new gem 'What's Your Damage', re-acquainting the audience with their distinctive angular guitar-shredding and state synthesizer effects. Pausing in between songs to interact with the crowd, the band felt obliged to constantly self-deprecate, with boundless apologies for their 'rubbish' album, and 'poor' performance. Humility may be good for the soul but let's not go too far lads! Indeed, the combination of energetic, sporadic guitar riffs, screeching vocals and frantic. hard hitting bass highlighted how incomparable the band are to anything currently in mainstream music. Since their last show at The Faversham, it is noticeable they have managed to garner quite a following, and their performance of instantly recognisable and commercially-friendly debut single 'Circle Square Triangle' infinitely caused the most furore within the venue, as almost every Indie Scenester felt compelled to violently launch themselves from the speakers, thrash away on air guitars or twist and shake their bodies in a peculiar fashion.

All in all this was a very good showing and the audience left fragile, but satisfied. Not top marks but cool progression from the icides.

Far from being packed in like stabled horses, there was a reassuringly comfortable turn out at the Packhorse for this show case of Leeds' finest, These Monsters and their well chosen adversaries, Meet me in St. Louis, Christa Pike and Fortune favours the Brave. The small upstairs room was opened by fortune favours... and I couldn't help being slightly disappointed seeing as the line up promised so much.

Obviously influenced by bands such as Isis and Will Haven These heavy set boys had a sound which didn't live up to the potential of the Pack horses' Impressive p.a and sound Tech and instead Fell short of their intended destination, leaving their chugging riffs sounding somewhat cloudy and stifl The bands overall approach set the tone for the evening ahead, and had an interesting effect on any late comers to the show, causing bottom lips to protrude and brows to Furrow in a head-down rock salute to the Gods of distortion- highly amusing. 6/10

Feeling somewhat Mauled by the Quagmire of sound I'd just experienced I certainly wasn't ready for the aural onslaught of Christa Pike and I don't think much could've prepared me. Christa Pike are Dorset's Kick and Punch five-piece which forcefully grabbed hold of my adrenal glands and wrung them back into life. With influences evidently ranging from post-punk to unfathomable Jazz, they often sounded like each member was marching to a different drum (a fantastic quality). This then shifted into impressive and tightly cohesive stabbing and fittering riffs. All the while, pungent, menacing Vocals are expertly juxtaposed with the chaos, Very impressive, a taste of things to come. 6/10

Next up are Meet me in St. Louis. My immediate thoughts are concerning their name; which I regrettably admit to thinking could be an insight into their sound, how fucking wrong was 11? There I am, half expecting some kind of Death Cab meets Bright eyes Indie Musings, and I am met with a super-tight, charismatic, post-punk style math-rock implosion, fucking awesome! Their passion and obvious technical superiority are abundantly evident and they swoon through tracks, splicing through song structure boundaries and their choppy guitars sit flush with primeval, machine-like drums and heart-felt, captivating vocals. Truly impressive.

An evening of such impressive, varied sounds could only have been sewn up by a very special band indeed. These Monsters are this band. Their sound is the satisfying antithesis to all of the night's precursors, a rich, opulent wealth of captivating sound scapes which pitch and drift between melodic jazz and bone-shaking, clatter ing riffs. Their music exudes a melancholy warmth which is a beautiful alternative to the sharp tongue of the previous bands. Cool, smooth sax lines sit seamlessly next to grumbling, simmering guitars and, as a result negate the need for any vocals. Think Mogwai meets check engine in the best possible way. These monsters are truly a force to be reckoned with, be ready to be memorised, captivated and bludgeoned to a stunned silence. 9/10



## The Strokes First Impressions

Rack in 2001 when The Strokes swan gered onto the scene, they were everything that the music world had been crying out for. There was a severe shortage of idols with young impressionable kids forced to worship and, in the middle of their mid-life

five guys from New York (so much cooler than LA), who dressed like they'd just been dragged through an Oxfam backwards, smoked more than Oxiam backwards, smoked more than they breathed and referenced bands like The Velvet Underground and Television, not Black Sabbath and Metallica. The music industry went mental, girls swooned, men remembered what rock 'n' roll actually was seed The Storker deceaded the first and The Strokes dropped the first great album of the 21st century.

When The Strokes returned in 2003 with Room On Fire, the initial hype subsided to an under whelmed feeling. And now, just over four years after the genre-creating is This It, it's amazing how quickly people forget to respect their elders. Like a teenager telling granddad to shut up about the war, no-one seems too keen to listen. Ironically, First Impressions of

Earth is The Strokes most diverse, innovative and brilliant of their three albums, From first track. You Only Live Once', the most Strokesy song on the album, to last track 'Red Light' via the thunder rumble of single 'Juicebox' and Barry Manllow rip-off'Razorblade', Casablancas and co. continually push the limits. There are continually push the limits. There are still plenty of neat guitar lines and Casablancas' growls but listening to First Impressions... makes you realise how far within themselves. The Strokes were playing on their first two albums. The finest example of this comes on 'Vision of Division' a song about not getting on with your girlfriend's mates, which might have been lo-fi and laid back with the old Strokes, but now it's a 4 minute plus, expertly crafted epic that swings from whining ditty, to full-blooded drunken

Inspite of its excellence though, First Impressions... will never be as influential as Is This It, but take the time to listen to it. It's the sound of The Strokes as musicians, as artists fulfilling their potential not the sound of The Strokes as icons. (8)

## Beck Guerolita Polydor

I'll be Beck

On Guerolito Beck has recruited a selection of artists to remix his 2005 Polydor release, Guero. In doing so, he has created an album that, despite its origins, feels extremely

While Guero started off lively but quickly lost momentum with a big focus on Beck's own voice and a quiet intro spection that became, at times, overly self involved, in Guerolito there is never a dull moment. It features its Spanish influences more prominently than Guero with tracks such as Collective's remix of the single 'Guero' providing a celebratory holiday feel.

Not all the adaptations work, as the use of ran-

dom and disjointed hoots, clicks and beeps in songs such as 'Ghost Range (E-Pro)' and 'Shake' Shake Tambourine (Black Tambourine)' make them sound more like eighties electronic keyboard noises than modern remixes.

other times, Beck and his remix artists appear to attempt to pack three or four different songs into one and in 'Girl', probably the most famous track off Guero, many of the subtleties of the original are lost with the introduction of a

powerful beat which overpowers some of its tune and the effect of chord changes that were so key to the track. Yet overall, Guerolito, which was created simultaneously

with Guero, is an impressive success, combining Beck's fragile ye powerful vocals with a variety of unusual instruments from bass clarinet to strings, majestic choral interludes and funky beats to produce tunes that, despite their seeming simplicity, are complex and intricate pieces of music. Tunes such as Ghettochip Malfunction (Hell Yes)' and 'Broken

Drum' are Guero as it should have been.

Despite some cock-ups in which the remix holds no possible comparison with the original, in his remake many of the songs now sound complete. Each track veers off in a different direction from its source due to the huge variety of influences involved in the album's making with tracks ranging from the inspired to the tragic to

the downright bizarre, contrasting heart-felt lyrical genius with apparent mindless destruction of a song that should never have been touched.

While Guero received a mixed

critical reception and was less successful than Beck might have desired, receiving acclaim from hardcore fans but recruiting few new ones, this remix is certainly worth a listen, even to those who haven't pre-

viously been Beck fans. (7) Jenny Birch

## Mark Wilson The Mixing Tin 19th January

Apparently you can squeeze a whole band into one guitar these days

After a few local lads playing power chords beneath transparent tales of being dumped I was beginning to wonder what I was doing at the 'Mixing Tin' on a lowly Thursday

Then the support ended his set by saying, 'you've been very kind, now please, stay around for Mark Wilson, he puts us all to shame', He was right.

St Helens' Mark Wilson started his set with an off beat country/jazz/blues piece of perfection called 'play with fire', but it's not just the how good it sounds its how he makes that sound. Listening to him on CD doesn't do him justice because it sounds as if there's three instruments playing at once, drums, rhythm and lead guitar, in fact all of this is made by one guitar. And I know what you're thinking, loop pedals ala KT Tunstall, but your wrong. He plays the guitar on his lap, one hand taps the string then strums, hitting the body of the guitar on the way

down and the base on the way up producing a drum sound. All this hap-pens whilst the other hand is both holding the strings at the vital moment and tapping the neck and body for extra snare-like sounds. Thus producing a perfect and complex drum rhythm that sits beneath a fast and complicated quitar melody, and he bloody sings over the top to rub it

Mark Wilson is very, very talented, but all this technical ability would be superfluous if not for his talent as a great songwriter. His set flows along with the kind of fast paced blues soul that fits the setting so well. Everybody in the room, about thirty in total, looks so privileged to be there. Everyone just sat at their tables, transfixed.

Highlights included, 'shade of blue', 'Distant Sun' and 'Play with fire', or perhaps the whole gig.

It was so refreshing to see some-

body doing something so different and yet so classic, with a sound that would appeal to most people. Which begs the question, 'why has no-one heard of this man?'. If you ever get the chance to go see Mark Wilson, then please do, you will not be disappointed. (9) Neil Walker







# Legacy of

It is 25 years since the infamous Yorkshire Ripper was finally arrested and women in the north of England could relax after five years fearful that a serial killer could be lurking around any dark corner. Dan Johnson takes a look back at the Ripper murders and the lasting legacy of a vicious killer

n January 1981 police in Sheffield arrested Bradford lorry driver Peter Sutcliffe with a prostitute, noticing that his car had false plates. They charged him with stealing the plates but a hunch took one of the officers back to the scene where he found a hammer and a knife. After two days of questioning, Sutcliffe suddenly confessed to being the Yorkshire Ripper and detailed 13 murders and seven further attacks where the victims had survived. The Sheffield prostitute had been saved from becoming the Yorkshire Ripper's 14th victim. Not revealed at the time was that when police strip searched Sutcliffe they found him wearing a V-neck sweater upside

he was mentally ill so he could be held at a secure hospital, far more luxurious than the maximum-security prison where he would oth-erwise be incarcerated. Richard has written to Sutcliffe and almost arranged to meet him but media interest in the case made them both agree it was not the right time. 'I don't think I would meet him now, I have learned what sort of person he is. If he agreed to have a meeting he would just try to manipulate me in some It was reported recently that Sutcliffe wants to have a son and he plans to name him Richard. Richard McCann is suspicious; Where the hell has Richard come from? believe it's a way to taunt me, I think he is trying to get to me because I have badmouthed him'. Leeds Student also wrote to Peter Sutcliffe but he declined to answer any of our Richard and his three sisters were taken

straight to a children's home after the death of their mother and they never lived a normal life again. They were taken to live with their father who Richard describes as 'a very violent man with no parenting skills'. The Ripper would go on to kill another 12 women in the north of England over the next five years and Richard explained his feelings during that time; 'I feared that Mum's killer was going to come after me, and that affected me as a kid. I used to think he was out there and coming after me. I remember going to the woods with my Dad and I was left alone, about seven yeas old and I just felt that the Yorkshire Ripper was going to kill me and I started scream

hysterically'. He says openly that he still has dreams about the man who took his mum's

taken a long time to rectify'. He refuses to believe Sutcliffe's defence that he heard meslife; 'In one I was running down the canal and he was chasing me with a gun, a rifle. Suddenly the dream changed and he was sages from God telling him to kill prostitutes and says his mum wasn't working as a prosti-tute anyhow. Richard is upset that Sutcliffe was able to fool the authorities into believing strung up over the canal by his feet and I had spikes on my shoes and I was kicking his face, disfiguring his face Leeds was the Yorkshire Ripper's favourite hunting ground and he found six of his victims in the city. In June 1977 he murdered Jayne MacDonald, a 16-year-old shop assistant walking home along Chapletown Road after a night out in Leeds. She lived just six doors away from Wilma McCann and had been a behaviour for Richard and his detarm. That is babysitter for Richard and his sisters: 'That is when it went crazy for me because when that girl was murdered and I realised who she was I thought, hang on a minute, he's killed my mum round the back of the house and he has seen our babysitter and he's come back a few years later, found the babysitter and murdered her; he really knows who we are'. The murder of such a young woman clearly threw doubt over the speculation that the Ripper was pick-ing off prostitutes although Sutcliffe said he

> of a monster I had become'. Sutcliffe's murderous campaign did not relent however and his net widened butchering women in Bradford, Huddersfield, Halifax and Manchester, where he killed prostitute Jean Jordan on some allotments. Sutcliffe had paid her for sex with a five-pound note and when no death was reported after ten days, he returned to retrieve this evidence from the undiscovered body. Unable to locate the note on the rotting body he became angry and attacked Jean body ne became angry and attacked Jean Jordan's corpse with broken glass, mutilating her and attempting to cut off her head. She was eventually found the next morning by Bruce Jones who would later play Les Battersby in Coronation Street. Police did find the note and traced it back to the firm where Sutcliffe worked. They began interviewing employees and Sutcliffe was questioned but was not thought to be a suspect as he said he was holding a housewarming party on the evening in question. This was true but he later revealed that he had gone to Manchester after

district. His statement read; 'The next one I did I still feel terrible about, it was the young

girl Jayne MacDonald. I read recently about

her father dying of a broken heart and it

brought it all back to me. I realised what sort

dropping off his party guests.

It has surprised many how Sutcliffe kept his murderous activities from his friends, leagues and family, including his wife Sonia. He later confessed to police that he expected them to knock on his door at any time; 'When the Ripper came up in conversation at work or in a pub I was able to detach my mind from the fact that it was me they were talking about and I was able to discuss it normally. It amazed me at times that I was able to do this'. Police did knock on his door a total of nine times but the amount of data collected in the massive hunt meant that proper files were not kept, pieces of evidence were never linked together and police kept ruling Sutcliffe out of the investi-gation. The 'Wearside Jack' tapes sent to police diverted much effort into looking for a man with a Sunderland accent and undoubtedly helped Sutcliffe to avoid suspicion and con tinue to kill. In October last year, 49-year-old John Humble from the Ford area of Sunderland was arrested for sending the hoax tapes although he denies the charge. have even suggested that Sutcliffe didn't act alone or that he was a copycat killer only guilty of some of the murders whilst the real Yorkshire Ripper still walks free.

The Yorkshire Ripper's final murder took place in Leeds on a wet Monday evening, November 17th 1980. Peter Sutcliffe told police how he drove to Headingley from his home in Bradford and sat in his car eating food from the Kentucky Fried Chicken at the Arndale Centre. As he drove back out onto Otley Road he spotted a young woman heading towards Alma Road at the far end of the shops. He followed her slowly for a short distance before launching his attack; 'I took my ham-

mer out of my pocket and struck her a blow on the head. She fell down. She was making a noise. By this time I was again in a world of my own, out of touch with reality. I pulled her clothes off, most of them. I had a screwdriver on me; I think it had a yellow handle and a bent blade. I stabbed her in her lungs. Her eyes were wide open and she seemed to be looking at me with an accusing stare. This shook me up a bit, I jabbed the screwdriver into her eyes but they stayed open, and I felt worse than ever. I left her lying on her back...I think she was dead when I left'.

down with his legs through the arms, the open neck exposing his groin, suggesting a sexual motive behind his crimes.

The Yorkshire Ripper began attacking women around West Yorkshire in 1975 but it was not until October that he became a killer. On the night of October 30th he picked up Wilma McCann, a 28-year-old mother of four, on Roundhay Road in Leeds. According to Sutcliffe she offered him sex for five pounds and they drove to nearby playing fields. He claims she said 'come on, get it over with' to which he replied 'don't worry, I will'. He struck her over the head several times with a hammer and stabbed her in the neck, chest and abdomen. In his statement he later said "That was the turning point. I realise I over-reacted at the time, nothing I have done since then affected me like this'. A milkman found the body of Wilma McCann early the next morning, lying half naked on an embankment just yards from her family home, her strawberry blond hair matted with blood. Sutcliffe's confession is revealing; 'After that first time, I developed and built up a hatred for prostitutes in order to justify within myself the reason why I had attacked and killed Wilma

Richard McCann is the only son of Wilma and was five at the time his mum was murdered. He describes how the Ripper took away his mother and made him very insecure; took away any confidence I had as a kid and I expected to die at any moment - death was so close to me, it was quite damaging and it has



His final victim was 20 year old Jaqueline Hill, a 3rd year English student at the University who had just got off the bus in Headingley and was making her way back to the halls of residence. Peter Sutcliffe was found guilty on 13 counts of murder and seven of attempted murder. After being attacked whilst in prison he was moved to Broadmoor secure hospital where he remains. He was sentenced to a minimum of 30 years and could apply for release in

Richard McCann has set up a group to find and support the other children who lost their mothers at the hands of Peter Sutcliffe. Some have been unwilling to talk about their links with the murders or even to acknowledge their relationship to Sutcliffe's victims but others have embraced the network Richard has created and he has also

met with the surviving victims of the Ripper's attacks. After time in the army Richard hit a low point in the mid 1990s when he got involved in drugs and spent when he got involved in drugs and spent time in Armley prison, where Sutcliffe him-self was held for a short period. Richard admits he considered suicide but has now turned his life around and is studying for a Social Policy degree at the university after staring at the Parkinson tower throughout his childhood. He wants to go on to help disadvantaged kids who have suffered like him and his sisters. He is keen to point out that he is not obsessed by the Ripper murders and enjoys mountain biking, salsa and charity work and now has a family of his

## Toeing the centre line







Menzies Campbell is left of centre, Pete Bicknell wonders how our

he last year has seen a flurry of activity in UK politics. There has been a general election, controversial bills being put forward to the House of Commons, and changes of leadership in the Conservatives, with the Liberal Democrats and Labour to follow shortly Added to this there is a battle raging, one that is set to continue right up until the next general election, and, no, it's not a battle between left and right, or socialism versus capitalism, it is a new struggle, one that is set to define early 21st-century British politics; the fight for the centre ground. Tony Blair has it, David Cameron wants it, and whoever becomes leader of the Liberal Democrats will want a slice of it too.

So what is the centre ground? It is fair to say that the political centre does change with time, but it is usually the position taken in the fairly large area between left-wing and right-wing politics. In essence, to be centrist is to embrace capitalism but also to give a nod to the poor. In days gone by to find the centre ground you looked to the Liberals but in modern-day politics the ideology behind the centre ground has best been encapsulated by Tony Blair and New Labour. On the one hand economic

growth is considered extremely impor-

tant, but so is climate change and the environment. Taxes remain low but there is an emphasis put on tackling poverty. Welfare, education and public services are key words to the New Labour government, but they would not be averse to using private money in order to achieve their goals. These policies are appealing to politicians for it looks like a way to please everyone in society; so appealing in fact that the main UK political parties have done a lot of travelling in their pilgrimage to the centre

For Labour, the journey took some time. Operating as a left-wing party throughout the 20th century, they were badly hurt by the arrival of Margaret Thatcher on the political scene in the 1970s and began rethinking their poli-cies. During the 1980s Labour's attachment to socialism began to wane and during Neil Kinnock's years in charge the party softened its opposition to privatisation and began to distance itself

from the unions. When Tony Blair became leader in 1994 he ditched clause four of the Labour constitution, therefore severing the ties between Labour, socialism and public ownership. They re-branded themselves as New Labour and the march to the centre continued from Conservative's movement

towards the centre has been far more recent and far more sudden. Historically a right-wing party, their movement cross the political spectrum began in 1997 - the catalyst being Tony Blair's landslide election victory - but at first it was not the centre they were seeking. The Conservative parties of William Hague, Iain Duncan Smith and Michael Howard moved the party further to the right before David Cameron began the process of moving the Tories into the centre ground when he took over in December 2005. As for the Liberal Democrats, they have remained a party rooted in the centre although their membership contains politicians of both the right and left, so for them centrism is perhaps the compromise that keeps them together. This scrap for the centre ground raises some issues for us all. The leaders of the three main political parties believe that the centre ground is the only way to

become electable; in other words, they believe that the centre ground is what the majority of the public want. Labour, for example, could support this by saying that they had very limited success as a socialist party (Clement Attlee's government excepted) but once they had aimed for the centre they found themselves with massive public support. The Tories clearly hope to do well in the next election - operating from the centre - and the common belief is that they will.

LUU's political societies say that there membership refelects the national towards centrist politics. Conservative Future have a number of different views on ideology and the leadership, but they are expecting an increase membership following David Cameron's arrival, which suggests that they are broadly happy with a centrist leading the party. The Liberal Democrats Society told me that their membership 'centre to centre-left", believed that all the main parties were operating

around the centre-ground and that "left and right" were becoming old terms Greg Mulholland, Liberal Democrat MP for Leeds North-West, commented: "As a party we do not formulate policies that fit into an ideological category to suit the electorate, we form policies on principles which are what we believe will create a free, fair and just society." As with his compatriot in the student society he also implied that "left" and "right" becoming obsolete terms

However, as well as the arguments for operating within the centre-ground there are also arguments against it. It's worth noting that the voter turnouts have not been good in recent years with 2001 and 2005's general elections only polling 59 per cent and 61 per cent respectively compared to figures of 78 per cent in 1992 and 71 per cent in 1997. Many traditional Labour supporters have become disillusioned, and they have stopped turning out at elections or even tried protest voting. At Question Time on January 12, Norman Tebbit hinted that there may be frustrations among some Tory voters over Cameron's move to the centre, a view shared by a Tory audience member who felt he may have to vote for a minority party next time. So, the question is; are the main party leaders correct to aim for the centre? Do the public see the country's political future positioned in the centre ground with the vote winners being those who can manage and nurture it the most successfully, or are we about to witness a new era of discontent with the main political establishments of Westminster? Only time will tell.

# One woman

Last December, five *Leeds Student* readers won a copy of Lonely Planet's *One People* - a book of photographs and essays celebrating people from all walks of life all over the globe. Kirsty Bennett caught up with Commissioning Editor Laetitia Clapton to discuss the conception of the book.

lease could you tell us about the conception of the book? What was the guiding thought behind it?

Lonely Planet has always encouraged people to connect with the counties that they visit. We believe that
travel is most enriching when you
meet local people, stay in their homes,
use local businesses and support local
concerns. Only then do you really get
under the skin of a place. One People
celebrates this connection. It also celebrates the fact that although we may
live in different situations, work in different circumstances and have very
different backgrounds, we are all
human, we are all people.

What was your aim with One People, what kind of effect did you hope it would have on both individuals who read it, and the genre as a whole?

On the one hand reading Onepeople is an education – through looking at the photographs and reading the
text you learn about people all across
the world, and close the book with
greater knowledge than you had
defore. But it's not a dry, boring education. We've not shrunk from addressing all aspects of life – a malnourished
boy being weighed in Uganda, an
Entrean lady breast-feeding during a
literacy class, a refugee camp in
Afghanistan, Polish check-out girls,
lesbian love, pre-pubescent beauty
queens, a collection of human skulls.

Through pairing the images to show contrasts and similarities, the book also surprises the reader. The Pakistani cricketers breaking play for prayer contrasts well with the Peruvian nuns breaking from prayer to play to be seen ovice monks in Myanmar toying with a plastic gun. The photo of a young boy surfing in Australia is a fake – he is standing in front of a photograph. The truth is not always what it seems.

This is a departure from the classic organization of the classic organization of the composition of the composition of the concept of the concept of the concept and the photographs. Many pictures have greater impact in this way. The lady sorting chillies in India is a magnificent swathe of red, made all the more powerful when juxtaposed with the American groundsman creating his perfect green pitch. While individually grabbing, the images real-

ly leap off the page as a result of the

On the other hand, the book should also be an enriching, fun read. The photographs are all beautifully shot and the book is a pleasure to browse. Many images are amusting – the elderly synchronised swimmers making formations in matching red costumes, the lady who lives in a converted Boeing jet, the men at Oktoberfest, the Many others are uplifting – the couple holding hands in the USA, the Indian wedding, the elderly couple tying the knot.

Conceptually we wanted to produce something that was different from existing photography books. Current photographic publications about people tend to focus either on antiropology and tribes, or on predictable cosy images. Our book is not afraid to show the darker sides of life, and many images are suprising – it is not prodictable. And it doesn't treat the people as scientific studies but more as people. One People.

The book is divided into eight sections – could you tell us about how you chose these?

Broadly speaking they represent the chronological phases that every person goes through. That said many of them occur throughout our lives – love, reflection and living – and many of them touch us all the time – birth and death in particular. It made sense to divide the book like this as these are experiences that affect all of us, no matter where in the world we are.

It seems a bold move to include a section called 'Die' – obviously this is apart of life but is often glossed over in books of this genre. Was this a difficult decision to come to?

No. We wanted this book to be a true exploration of the human experience and death is as much a part of that as birth. For some cultures death is not seen as a miserable time but an excuse for a festival — look at the candy skulls that are sold at the Day of the Dead ritual in Mexico. Leaving this section out would have made the book incomplete.

The images in the book are diverse, across a range of cultures and varying levels of modernity. Did you have any specific criteria for choosing images from the book?

First of all each image had to be of excellent quality. The pairings had to be chosen carefully – each image had to compare or contrast with its partner on either a compositional, purely visual or content level or any combination of these. And finally we wanted to

Could you tell us about some of the photographers who work for Lonely Planet. Are they all free-

lancers or do some hold contracts?

All the Lonely Planet photographers are freelancers who are represented by Lonely Planet Images. We do occasionally commission shoots for particular books, but in general the photographers' pictures are sold through the stock library which acts like an agent for them.

Many of our readers are see photography as their future; do you have any advice for people wishing to start out in a career in Photography?

First of all get yourself enrolled in a decent photography course so that you learn how to do it properly. A good course will also offer advice on getting work once you're ready. Study the work of photographers you admire and carry your camera with you at all practise makes perfect! Consider what area of photography you wish to specialise in and work towards it. Contact the British Journal of Photography to find out about trade shows where you can speak to experts and get feedback on your portfolio. Build a website so that you can showcase your images easily. And network people hire people so the more people in the industry you can meet, the more chances you have of getting work. Finally if you're particularly interested in travel photography check out Lonely Planet's Travel Photography guide by successful travel photographer Richard l'Anson

ment will be joining Vice-Chancellor Professor Michael Arthur to head the Campus Walk on Wednesday and there will be


from stress management to giving up smoking. Healthy meal deal options will also be available in University and Union catering outlets and WeightWatchers will be on hand for dieting advice.

# Sven will he learn? Off To A Winner

Sven-Goran Eriksson's eventful tenure as England manager will end after this summer's World Cup in Germany. A week after the Swede had to apologise to

his players after allegations made in a Sunday newspaper, Eriksson had to face his bosses at the FA on Monday to discuss the emergence of fresh comments he had allegedly made. Prior to Monday's meeting, FA Chief Executive Brian Barwick stated that: "Allegations made during the past week have not been good for the game's image." With this in mind it is of no surprise that Eriksson had to leave after the World Cup whether this was part of his original intentions or

Eriksson's departure after this summer's tour-nament means that his players face the same predicament that their predecessors faced under Bobby Robson and Terry Venables going into Italia 1990 and Euro 1996 respectively. The per-formances of these England teams in both major tournaments should allay the doubt of some fans who believe that Eriksson's departure after the World Cup will affect the performances of play-ers who do not need unnecessary distractions.

Eriksson's most recent alleged comments however should have much more far reaching consequences. The furore surrounding Eriksson's departure will hopefully not distract those in the football world from addressing the comments he is alleged to have made about the existence of corruption in the Football League. Luton Town

manager. Mike Newell, has shone light on one of football's murkiest issues. By claiming that he was offered money by agents and club officials in return for selling players he has shown that cases such as George Graham's in 1995 were not just instances of the game's past life.

During the 2004-20005 season Championship

clubs spent £7 million on agents' fees



Premiership clubs do not have to disclose the amount that they pay agents which makes Eriksson's alleged claims that managers of three leading clubs are putting "money in their pock-ets" all the more sinister. Manchester United are currently the only club to show the figures paid to agents, yet their chief executive, David Gill, has this week threatened to withhold such information if other clubs do not follow Manchester

Former FA Chief Executive Graham Kelly, who held the post from 1988 to 1998, has argued that: "It's an absolute scandal that there is no proper financial regulation system within football." The manner in which the FA has tackled the issue in the past provides strong foundations for OPR manager Ian Holloway's pessimism that his claims will not make the FA act. However, Premier League Chief Executive Richard Scudamore's recent announcement that an independent inquiry will take place to investigate alleged bung transfer payments shows that the FA is taking the matter seriously. The FA's compliance unit which pays special attention to financial malpractice in the game will also still be in operation

The England manager's alleged comments about the existence of corruption at leading clubs may "not have been good for the game's image" yet by (unwittingly though it may be) entering into this debate he has given the FA further cause and urgency to investigate this situation for the good of the game.

Tom Biggs speaks to *Leeds Student* on the weekend win and his new coach Daryl Powell

Last Sunday saw the Leeds Tykes demolish the Cardiff Blues by a massive 48 to 3 in what was to be the Tykes' best team reformance of the season so far.

With the calamity of events in Calvisano the previous weekend it was a welcoming triumph not only for the team but also for newly promoted first team coach Daryl Powell. It was a match where at least 10 men could have been named man of the match, however the accolade ultimately fell on Tykes captain lustin Marshall

Coincidently, it was Marshall who got the scoring underway with a perfect drop goal within the first few minutes to make the score 3-0 in the Tykes favour and soon after it was not long before Andre Symman got the first of Leeds' seven tries. Gordon Ross followed up a simple conversion, which was to be the first of

After Symman's try, the Blues put the Tykes under some relative pressure but they showed strength in their tackling to halt any advances.

Leeds Student caught up with Tom to hear his verdict of the agnatch, the promotion of Daryl Powell to

head coach and what the win has done for the Tykes

For many, it has been good news that the Tykes have had a new coach appointed as prior to Sunday's triumph the Tykes had only mustered up a meagre six wins all season. On asking whether Powell's promotion to first team coach has helped lift spirits within the dressing room and on the field, Tom said: "Daryl has helped a grent deal, we knew he was a fantastic rugby league coach and hopefully he will become a fantastic union coach too. I've very much enjoyed working with him as well, not just at present but throughout the summer and auturn as well."

Although Sunday's match saw the Tykes gain an emphatic win, Bath's loss against Leinster meant the Tykes failed to grab one of the best runner-up spots to ensure their place in this year's quarter final, a match which would have seen them face the mighty Toulouse. On asking how Tom fell he played, he replied: "I was pleased with how I played on Sunday, the fact that we scored seven tries and only needed five was a real bound although it was really disappointing not to make the quarter finals.

"The fact that we had studied videos of how Cardiff like to play beforehand really helped too, analysing their game plan was a real help to us. It was just a shame we could not make the quarters after setting out what we needed to do and displaying it on the pitch".

After such a comprehensive win on Sunday it is hoped that the Tykes can revert their Heineken Cup form into their league matches as the Tykes currently lie 12th staring relegation in the face. Much like the Tykes, the Saints have seen much of their best form in Europe this year after they secured a place in the European Challenge Cup quarter finals against fellow Guinness Premiership team Worcester. Looking forward to this weekend's action, from commented on how crucial the game is and how the Tykes need to impress, he said: "We need to win. There will be a hig crowd and we need to impress, we know the Saints have good players with the likes of Carlos Spencer, Ben Cohen and Steve Thompson in their ranks. It is a game where we have to keep our current momentum going and get the win".

Last Sunday's game saw Tom come up against the rugby legend Jonah Lomu. Lomu burst on to the rugby scene back in 1995 with devastating performances in both the World Cups of that year and in 1990

However, since then Lomu has been very much on the sidelines due to medical problems and has only been playing competitive rugby once again since a few weeks ago. Although not back to his former self yet. Lomu is still a colossal presence on the field.
